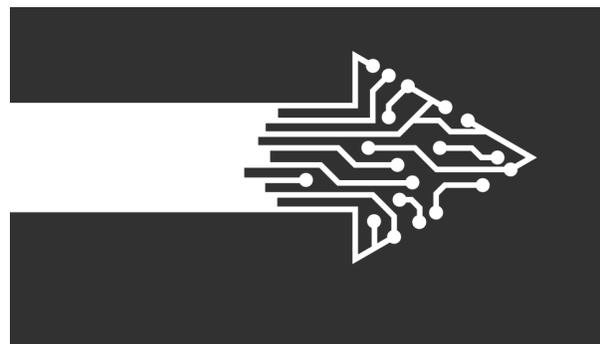


When the DA4A team gathered at the end of last year, we collectively reflected on the initiative's impact in 2022 and began establishing a path forward for 2023. As we reflected on significant milestones, we noted the following highlights:

Our Network: Our network of stakeholders has **grown** regionally, domestically, and internationally. Partnerships in our Big Tent Webversations provided connective tissue for our local governments to expand their collaborations in building their statewide local technology plans. DeSoto and Sarasota counties developed and designed plans for submission to the [Department of Economic Opportunity](#). These submissions ensure eligibility to compete for funds from the Federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Act for the Expansion of Broadband.

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Sarasota County Libraries Joins the Digital Navigator Program

we completed the second Digital Navigator cohort last year, the region gained 11 certified [Digital Navigators](#). Now there are six organizations included in the Suncoast Digital Navigator Network. Launching the third Cohort in early 2023 ensures three new organizations will join, bringing the region to 33 trained/certified Digital Navigators by June 30. Our focus in 2023 is to support these organizations and their navigators to expand their network.



[The Sarasota County Libraries](#) is the final organization to join the third cohort of the [Digital Navigator Program](#), sponsored by The Patterson Foundation. Four library staff completed their digital navigation training in February, and the program's lead and training facilitator, [Maribel Martinez](#), is thrilled with their participation and commitment to closing the digital divide in Sarasota County. Continue reading about the additional knowledge they have gained, which complements their [Tech Navigator Service](#) and continues supporting their patrons' computing needs.

Telehealth and Teletherapy Project: In search of information, we opened our Telehealth and Teletherapy Project in 2022 and quickly saw that access to these services is a deep concern. Telehealth will be featured in the National Philanthropy Scan workshop series in March. These workshops, hosted in collaboration with the [National Campaign for Grade-Level Reading](#), have convened an audience of funders across the country that focus on solutions in Digital Equity.

Looking ahead into this new year, we are focusing on the economic importance of growing training and employment opportunities in our region's technology careers. Our team is solid, focused, and proud of the connections we've established and nurtured, but most appreciative of our partners' collaboration to close the digital divide for people of all ages in our region.

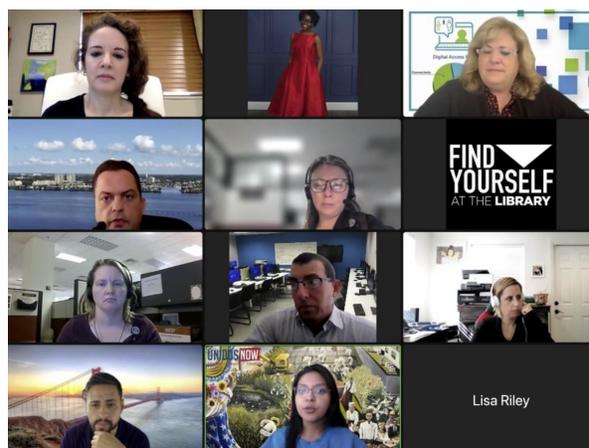
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DA4A Officially Kicks Off Cohort 3 of the Digital Navigator Program

National Philanthropy Scan Workshop 3: Digital Access & Devices: Scaling the Work Domestically & Internationally With Corporate & Nonprofit Partners

This was DA4A's third of eight Digital Access Funder Workshops, which we co-hosted with [The Campaign for Grade-Level Reading](#). [Michael Zimmerman](#), DA4A's National Initiative Development Lead, facilitated a fruitful conversation engaging the panelists and participants in meaningful discussion around catalyzing widespread device ownership in communities of need. Participants dove into sustainability topics and removing barriers of access in their breakout rooms, learning from one another, sharing new ideas, and exploring possibilities. With diverse perspectives, funders contributed with knowledge about where the work has succeeded, where it hasn't, and approaches to funding devices domestically and internationally. The convening resulted in a highly engaging experience with tons of new and important connections made as we think collectively about how to close this gap.

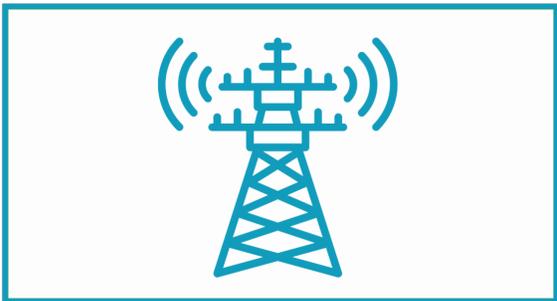

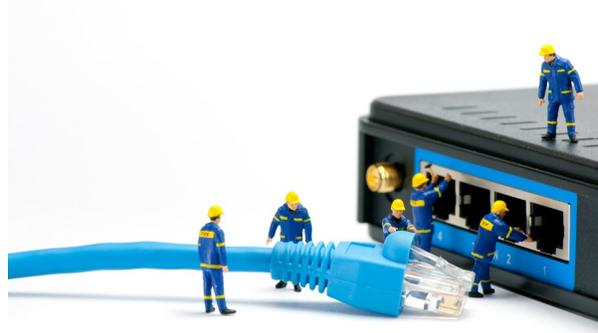


Fast Fact #3: — Why Digital Access for All is Needed

Karen Stewart shares the need to build a robust workforce to meet the program goals and timelines of the [National Telecommunications and Information Administration's](#) \$42.5 billion Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment ([BEAD](#)) Program. The BEAD program is expected to drive historic investment in a skilled, competitive, and diverse workforce. Effective strategies to prepare displaced and disadvantaged workers for better jobs, including competitive pay and benefits, will need to be developed. To analyze the needs in our communities, Karen reached out to [CareerSource Suncoast](#) to gather some insight into the need for job skills, training, and development for the future workforce.
